On Saturday, December 7th, 2024, the San Diego Association of Environmental Professionals held a fieldtrip to visit the Otay River Restoration Program site. The group consisted of biologists, planners, architects, interns, land managers and individuals interested in restoration projects. The Otay River Restoration Project is in south San Diego County, in the Lower Otay River Watershed, downstream of Savage Dam and Otay Lakes. HomeFed is the mitigation bank sponsor, providing restoration for over 300 acres, restoring hydrology and fluvial processes to the river valley by reestablishing a low flow channel and floodplain terrace, seasonal ponds, as well as invasive species removal and enhancement of a large upland buffer. Enhancement and creation for a variety of sensitive species and habitats including least Bell's vireo, San Diego fairy shrimp, vernal pools, maritime succulent scrub, and native grassland are also provided in these restoration efforts. The group had a great time viewing the restoration site and seeing an active Bald Eagle onsite. San Diego AEP would like to thank SWCA's restoration team for hosting this exciting and educational event!

DID YOU KNOW?

- Most of San Diego's rivers are dammed.
- San Diego County shelters approximately 200 imperiled plants and animals which is more than any other county in the nation.
- 40% of all plastic littered or dumped ends up in the ocean each year. Surfrider collected 174,000 pieces of waste at a 2018 county clean up.
- 40% of edible food in San Diego County goes uneaten while 1 in 7 San Diegans face food insecurity. In California, 6 million tons of food is thrown away--that accounts for 18% of materials in the landfill while nearly 5 million Californians remain "food insecure."
- San Diego has more biodiversity than any county in the continental U.S.
- While people have been part of this landscape for 12,000 years, in just the last century and a half, our numbers have grown 500-fold.
